COMMUNICATION SCIENCES AND DISORDERS

THE DEPARTMENT

In 1923 WCU became the site of one of the first speech clinics in the United States. This led to the creation of the Department of Speech Pathology and Audiology in 1972, and the development of a master's program in the mid 1970s. In 1983 the department's name was changed to Communicative Disorders. In 2012 the department's name was changed to Communication Sciences and Disorders to reflect the program's commitment to a scientific basis for clinical management. The graduate program in speech-language pathology was first accredited in 1994 by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA).

THE PROGRAM

The M.A. in communicative disorders provides students with the academic and clinical practicum experience required to earn the American Speech and Hearing Association (ASHA) Certificate of Clinical Competence in Speech-Language Pathology (CCC-SLP).

Preparation for Pennsylvania teacher certification is also a part of the curriculum. Depending on a student's undergraduate background and on updated requirements established by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), additional courses may be required.

UNIQUE OPPORTUNITIES

West Chester University is set apart from many other graduate programs in communication sciences and disorders for the following reasons:

- Option of part-time study
- On-campus Speech and Hearing Clinic
- The department maintains a clinic where students can gain professional

- and practical experience concerning assessment and treatment of communication sciences and disorders.
- Thesis option
 Students have the option of completing
 a research thesis as part of their capstone
 experience.
- Affiliation sites
- Excellent medical and educational affiliation sites are available throughout eastern Pennsylvania and the Delaware Valley.
- Timely course work completion
- Students can complete the course work for this degree program, including Pennsylvania teacher certification, in a two-year period of full-time enrollment or a three-year period of part-time enrollment. Two off-campus clinical affiliations (medical and educational settings) are included in the program.

THE CURRICULUM

The program consists of 63 semester hours, including 36 semester hours of core courses and 27 additional semester hours of clinical practicum and affiliation. The specific courses and semester-hour allocations are available in the Graduate Catalog, which can be accessed through the University's Web site, www. wcupa.edu/.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants should submit the following materials to the Office of Graduate Studies and Extended Education:

- Completed graduate application, including 500-word goals statement (apply online at www.wcupa.edu/grad)
- Completed supplemental application form showing an undergraduate

- background of at least 30 semester hours related to communication sciences and disorders. This form is available on the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders' Web site.
- Submit a structured vita based on guidelines provided by the department (available from CollegeNet through WCU's online application process or from the download at http://wcupa.edu/_academics/healthsciences/commdisorder/).
- Official academic transcript(s) from all colleges and universities attended
- Two letters of recommendation
- Scores from the Graduate Record
 Examination (GRE). The average GRE
 scores received by previous applicants
 who were admitted to the program are
 provided on the department's Web page
 in the FAQ section of the Graduate
 Program tab: www.wcupa.edu/_

For admission, applicants must demonstrate excellent communication skills in a written goals statement.

All admissions materials must be received by the Office of Graduate Studies and Extended Education by February 15 of each year.

West Chester University offers high-quality graduate degrees in more than 70 disciplines or areas of study, as well as certificate and certification programs. In 1960, West Chester State Teachers College expanded its programs to include liberal arts and graduate degrees and, as a result, dropped "Teachers" from its name. In 1983, West Chester State College became one of the 14 institutions in the State System of Higher Education. Along with its university status, the school acquired a new system of governance and the opportunity to expand its degree programs.

Today, more than 15,400 graduate and undergraduate students, as well as 1,500 faculty and staff, study and work on the 406-acre campus. Situated in the Borough of West Chester, the campus is a picturesque mix of Gothic, Victorian, and modern architecture with pleasant, tree-shaded walks.

Strategically located at the center of the mid-Atlantic corridor, West Chester University is just 25 miles west of Philadelphia and 17 miles north of Wilmington, Del. The campus is convenient to major cultural institutions, recreational activities, and commercial businesses, many of which provide internship opportunities for WCU's students.
