PROGRAM OF STUDY

Steeped in the tradition of public education, West Chester University provides program access to a wide spectrum of the Commonwealth's citizens and values the richness of diversity of its student body, faculty, and staff. The Department of Graduate Social Work, fully accredited by the Council on Social Work Education, has its mission to provide a quality, affordable, and accessible master of social work degree in preparation for a career in an evolving, complex, technological, and global society. It prepares graduates who can think critically, communicate effectively, embrace diversity, respond to the needs of the disempowered, are committed to social justice, and are competent to practice with individuals, families, and communities. Graduates and faculty alike demonstrate a dedication to life-long learning and evaluation of practice. Faculty members provide leadership in promoting social work scholarship and service.

With a concentration in direct practice with individuals, families, and communities, graduates from our program are prepared for theory-integrated practice in numerous social service settings. The education students receive at West Chester will prepare them to work in private and public social service agencies with a range of clientele, whether it be individuals in crisis struggling with critical life decisions or personal problems; families coping with losses, restructuring, or stress overload; or communities striving for autonomy.

THE CURRICULUM

The program consists of 54 semester hours of core courses plus six additional hours of electives that students can take within or outside the department. Students who take a full-time load of 30 semester hours

during the first and second year will be able to complete the program in two academic years.

A four-year, part-time plan is open to qualified applicants as an alternative to full-time study. Full-time and part-time program plans have a fall semester starting time only. Field placements for part-time students will be conducted during normal business hours.

An advanced-standing plan recognizes the achievement of outstanding B.S.W. graduates and regards as equivalent much of their completed course work. B.S.W. graduates from Council on Social Work Education-accredited programs within the last five years, with an overall grade point average of 3.0, a 3.25 GPA in social work courses, and the endorsement from their B.S.W. program director, are eligible for advanced standing. This is a 12-month, full-time program beginning in May with two summer sessions followed by two consecutive full-time semesters, culminating with graduation the following spring. A two-year, part-time advanced-standing program also begins in the summer session. The first year's curriculum stresses a

foundation with course work in human behavior in the social environment, social welfare policy, research, practice, and a field practicum of 16 hours per week in a social service agency. In the second year there are advanced courses in research, policy, and practice with individuals, families, and communities. Additionally, students are required to complete 20 hours per week in a social service agency.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students should submit the following materials to the Office of Graduate Studies and Extended Education:

- Completed graduate application (apply online at www.wcupa.edu/grad)
- A three- to five-page personal statement that articulates an interest and commitment to the purpose of the social work profession, an understanding of the program's mission and fit with one's career goals, reasons for attending graduate

school, and identification of significant life events or experiences that influenced the decision to pursue social work as a profession

- Two letters of recommendation (academic references must be included). A third letter of recommendation is required for advanced standing applicants from the applicant's B.S.W. program director.
- Official academic transcript(s) from all colleges and universities attended
- 3.0 or higher undergraduate GPA (provisional acceptance may be granted with a 2.80-3.0 GPA)
- Completion of course work in humanities, English composition, college math and science, U.S. history or political science, and social sciences
