ETHNIC STUDIES

The Ethnic Studies Institute, established in 1975, is a University-wide academic and cultural initiative to promote the appreciation of peoples and their diversity. The Ethnic Studies Institute oversees a minor in ethnic studies that is interdisciplinary in nature, drawing on faculty and resources of many disciplines, including anthropology, education, English, history, philosophy, political science, public administration, religious studies, social work, and sociology.

The goals of the program are to enhance appreciation and understanding of ethnic diversity through ethnic studies courses, research, scholarly conferences, and cultural endeavors.

Career Opportunities

West Chester University's 18-credit-hour minor in ethnic studies will prepare students to work with minority, diaspora, and transnational groups. The ethnic studies minor provides an avenue for students to gain knowledge, skills, and perspectives that are fundamental to civic participation, employability, and life. Critically examining the richness of America's historical and contemporary ethnic heritages offers an understanding of minority groups' experiences, in particular, and of social diversity, in general. This inquiry is well suited for working in the reality of our present global workforce. Our graduates do well in a host of diverse careers, such as policy analysis, counseling, social services, law and government, journalism, marketing, community and housing development, radio and television, health and medicine, and teaching.

Graduates of the program have gone on to advanced degree programs at Bryn Mawr College, Marywood College, Temple University, Indiana University, the University of Michigan, and the University of Pennsylvania. Others have attended law school at Dickinson College, Rutgers University, Temple University, Villanova University, and William and Mary.

In conjunction with the Department of Languages and Cultures, you can receive individual instruction in a number of languages. Several departments offer internships that have an ethnic component. In addition, the University offers opportunities to study abroad.

About West Chester University

A comprehensive, public institution, West Chester University offers high-quality undergraduate and graduate degree programs in more than 100 subject areas, as well as certification amd certificate programs. As one of the largest members of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, West Chester offers a full and rewarding educational experience as well as reasonable tuition.

With a rich heritage dating back to the 19th century, West Chester University was founded in 1871 as West Chester Normal School for the purpose of training teachers for the Commonwealth's newly established public schools. In 1960, West Chester State Teachers College expanded its programs to include liberal arts and graduate degrees and, as a result, dropped "Teachers" from its name. In 1983, West Chester State College became one of the 14 institutions in the State System of Higher Education. Along with its university status, the school acquired a new system of governance and the opportunity to expand its degree programs.

Today, more than 15,400 graduate and undergraduate students, along with 1,500 faculty and staff, study and work on the 406-acre campus. Situated in the Borough of West Chester, the campus is a picturesque mix of Gothic, Victorian, and modern architecture with pleasant, tree-shaded walks.

Strategically located at the center of the mid-Atlantic corridor between New York City and Washington, D.C., West Chester is just 25 miles west of Philadelphia and 17 miles north of Wilmington.
