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# 1. Executive Summary

## 25 Overview of West Chester University

26 Throughout its history, West Chester University (WCU) has served residents of Greater Philadelphia 27 and the tri-state region of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware and has been a cultural center for 28 Chester County. WCU had its origin in West Chester Academy, a private, state-aided preparatory and 29 teacher-training school founded in 1812. The academy became West Chester Normal School in 1871, 30 West Chester State Teachers College in 1927, West Chester State College in 1960, and West Chester 31 University in 1983, when it also became one of 14 universities in the Pennsylvania State System of 32 Higher Education (PASSHE). 33 Since the 1960s, WCU has offered a broad range of liberal arts and professional degree programs as a Master's I comprehensive institution. WCU is the largest campus in PASSHE and the fourth largest 34 35 institution of higher education in the Philadelphia region. Within PASSHE, WCU is known for its 36 academic excellence across all of its five colleges, the diversity of its student body, its innovative 37 business processes that promote efficiency, and its distributed-leadership approach. 38 The University continues to be ranked in Kiplinger Magazine's "best buys" in American public higher 39 education for seven consecutive years. Best buy is defined as a combination of affordability and 40 excellence and West Chester is one of only four public Pennsylvania schools ranked in the top 100. 41 42 Academic Programs 43 Currently, the University offers 118 baccalaureate-degree and more than 70 master's-degree and 44 graduate certificate programs as well as three doctoral programs through five academic colleges: College of Arts and Sciences, with thirteen departments 45 College of Business and Public Management, with seven departments 46 • College of Education, with seven departments 47 • 48 • College of Health Sciences, with six departments 49 • College of Visual and Performing Arts, with nine departments 50

## 51 Students and Enrollment

52 In fall 2015, WCU enrolled 16,611 students (14,226 undergraduate and 2,385 graduate students):

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- 55 This total enrollment represents a planned increase of 2,119 students from 5 years earlier. The
- 56 decision to grow was a function of declining allocations from the state and continuing applicant
- 57 demand resulting from favorable demographics in the Philadelphia region. To support the
- 58 institution's growth, both undergraduate and graduate admissions operations increased recruitment
- 59 efforts and investments in marketing were made. Most undergraduate students are of traditional age

- 60 (17-24). The campus residence halls and university-affiliated housing accommodate about 36% of the
- 61 total undergraduate student population and 64% live off-campus.
- 62 The Office of Undergraduate Admissions processed 17,258 first-year and transfer applications for fall
- 63 2014 and more than 20,000 applications for the spring and fall 2015 semesters. For fall 2015, 9,503
- 64 first-year and transfer applicants were offered admission, and 3,810 new students (2,395 first-year
- 65 students and 1,415 transfer students) were enrolled.
- 66 The University's top ten feeder high schools are within a 50-mile radius of WCU. The entering
- 67 classes for fall 2014 [including special admits, defined as students with demonstrated potential who
- 68 have either SAT scores or grade point averages below those of the regular admission criteria and who
- take a reduced (12-credit) course load during their first WCU semester] had a mean combined SAT
- score of 1077, a grade point average of 3.51, and were in the top 34% of their graduating class. The
- fall 2015 class (including special admits) had a mean combined SAT score of 1068, with a grade point
- average of 3.49, and were also in the top 34 % of their graduating class.
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## 74 Faculty and Staff

- 75 In fall 2015, West Chester University employed nearly 900 faculty members (627 regular and regular
- 76 part-time, and 269 temporary). Temporary faculty taught 24.6% of the institution's courses. Of the

permanent faculty, 53.5% are female and more than 14% are underrepresented minorities. Of the

- 78 permanent tenure and tenure-track faculty, 93.1% hold terminal degrees. Permanent and adjunct
- 79 faculty teaches all courses, and none are taught by graduate students.
- 80 The faculty, athletic coaches, certain technical and professional employees, and all other staff except
- 81 for managers and executives are unionized. Collective bargaining for all unions takes place at the state
- 82 or System level, with no local control over collective bargaining agreements. The unions represented
- 83 on campus are as follows:
  - American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees: AFSCME
  - Association of Pennsylvania College and University Faculties: APSCUF
- State College and University Professionals Association: SCUPA
- 87 Security, Police, and Fire Professionals of America: SPFPA
- Office of Professional Employees International Union Healthcare of Pennsylvania: OPEIU
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## 90 Campus

- 91 WCU's 402-acre campus combines 19th century collegiate Gothic and contemporary architecture,
- 92 and its quadrangle is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The campus comprises 62
- 93 major buildings with 2.6 million square feet.
- 94 On February 2, 1895, the campus of West Chester Normal School—now West Chester University—
- 95 was the site of the last public lecture by abolitionist and orator Frederick Douglass. In February 2006,
- 96 the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission approved a historical marker to commemorate
- 97 Douglass' last lecture, and in June 2008, the National Park Service certified the University's Frederick
- 98 Douglass Institute as part of the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom. A statue
- 99 honoring Frederick Douglass was erected on campus in 2012.
- 100 The University continues to implement its comprehensive facilities and technology master plans to
- 101 provide the necessary and appropriate support for its curricular and co-curricular programs. At the

- 102 same time, the University is committed to incorporating environmental sustainability into its projects
- 103 and operations. In 2010, President Weisenstein signed the American College and University
- 104 President's Climate Commitment, which obligates WCU to make a good faith effort to achieve a
- 105 carbon-neutral environment by 2025. This commitment includes constructing a campus-wide
- 106 geothermal HVAC system that will support new facilities and many existing campus buildings.
- 107 Building on Excellence
- 108 The new strategic plan Building on Excellence commenced in 2013. The plan is segmented into three
- 109 phases with each phase lasting three years. The plan is directly aligned with the university mission: 110
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- West Chester University, a member of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education, is a public, regional, comprehensive institution committed to providing access and offering high-quality undergraduate education, select post-baccalaureate and graduate programs, and a variety of
- educational and cultural resources for its students, alumni, and citizens of southeastern Pennsylvania.
- 115 As an academic institution of higher learning, WCU holds education as its primary purpose. This 116
- 117 fundamental goal is supported by five themes of the strategic plan: Academics, Diversity,
- 118 Engagement, Enrichment, and Sustainability. The relationships between the themes and the key
- 119 elements of WCU's mission are shown in Figure 1.2:

#### 134 The University's Approach to the Preparation of the Periodic Review Report (PRR)

135 Led by the Vice Provost's office, the preparation of the periodic review report began in fall 2014 and 136 a two-year timeline was developed to prepare the document. Key informant interviews were held
