UNDERSTANDING TECHNOLOGYFACTILITATED SEXUAL VIOLENCE


COVID-19 has us living our lives more online than ever before; no person ever deserves a violation of their autonomy, in any form.



WHAT IS TECHNOLOGYFACILIATED SEXUAL VIOLENCE?

- Use of websites and social media to initiate intimate contact with folks, including in person meetings.
- Use of cell phones to share pictures of non-consensual acts
- Use of cell phones to share recordings of non-consensual acts or media taken without the consent of all parties
- Sharing non-consensual videos or pictures on social media or websites
- Sending unsolicited images (e.g. dick picks, nude photos, etc.)_ through DMs or texts

CENTER CONSENT


Always ask! Promote consent in all forms by getting a clear, specific yes before sharing content, pictures, or videos.

OFFER SUPPORT


If a friend confides in you about a potential violation, listen and refer to resources so they can decide what healing looks like.



Report posts or comments that look concerning or contain content that may not be consensual. Utilize privacy settings to control who can see your content and send you messages.
