COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides the fundamental biomedical applications of fluid mechanics, heat, and mass transfer. Topics include: the principles and applications of biotransport fundamentals, fluid mechanics, macroscopic biotransport, 1-D steady and unsteady state transport, and general multidimensional microscopic transport.

EVALUATION & GRADING

Homework: Homework assignments will be announced in class and posted on the course website hosted on D2L with the due date and time noted. Homework assignments are to be submitted electronically through D2L course website or in class submission, typically one week after giving assignments.

Late homework will not be accepted unless prior permission is granted. No homework assignments are accepted after the graded assignments have been returned. If you want your homework grade reconsidered, you must see me within one week of the original grade being given.

Quizzes: Quiz will be given without notice during the semester. Typically, a quiz will cover last lecture contents. The quiz problem solutions will be posted in D2L after the quiz was graded. Students who are not able to attend a quiz (medical or other emergency) must notify the instructor by email before the quiz.

Project: An end-semester project will be assigned to each student. The project is typically a design of a biomedical component or a system using what they learn from the principles of biotransport. The final project will be submitted in the technical report format. It is to be submitted electronically through D2L course website or in class submission, typically by the end of the last week of semester.

Exams: The two midterms and the final exam are closed-book tests for which you are only required to bring a calculator and a pen. The final exam covers all course material during the entire semester (that is, it is a cumulative test). All tests use the problem format or short essay. Students who are not able to attend a test (medical or other emergency) must notify their instructor by email before the test.

Make-up Policy: In the case of a university sanctioned event, please schedule a makeup exam/quiz with me in advance. If you should miss an examination/quiz due to a certifiable emergency or illness, please notify me as soon as possible providing appropriate documentation and either a makeup exam/quiz will be arranged or your final exam score will replace the missed exam. All unexcused absences will result in a grade of zero.
